Terrapins' Coach Gary Williams Teams Up To Fight Colon Cancer New Public Service Campaign Targets Men to Get Important Screening Tests

Bethesda, MD, March 7, 2011 — Coach Gary Williams of the University of Maryland Terrapins has teamed up to create a new public service campaign on colon cancer screening awareness with the American College of Gastroenterology and the University of Maryland School of Medicine for March.

March is typically known for basketball's March Madness, but it is also Colon Cancer Awareness Month. Coach Williams' new TV spots, "Man to Man" and "March Madness," let viewers know that colon cancer screening is nothing to fear by capitalizing on Maryland's iconic slogan for its call-to-action: "Fear the Turtle. Don't fear colon cancer screening."

Coach Williams – the University of Maryland Terrapins all-time winningest head basketball coach, a national championship winner, and the 5th-winningest active head coach in NCAA Division I Basketball – has the ability to inspire and lead a team to victory. Those qualities make him the perfect spokesperson to mobilize the public to get screened for colon cancer, particularly a critical target audience: Men over age 50 who may be hesitant about screening tests.

The new TV public service announcements feature a powerful call-to-action from Coach Gary Williams who tells viewers: "A lot of men put off colon cancer screening and think if they aren't having a problem, then, why bother? What's your best defense against colon cancer? Talk to your doctor about screening, then get tested."

"This is an essential message from a public health perspective. Don't wait for symptoms or problems to develop before you talk to your doctor. Colon cancer screening is about the power of prevention. Too often, this message doesn't make the needed impact on men," explained Dr. Delbert L. Chumley, President of the American College of Gastroenterology.

"No one should die of fear or embarrassment," said Dr. Chumley. "Men over 50 can be a hard group to reach with the importance of colon cancer screening tests because there can be fear and reluctance. "

The American College of Gastroenterology is on a mission to fight colon cancer, the second deadliest cancer in the United States, but one of the most preventable with screening. ACG is grateful to join forces with a champion like Coach Gary Williams, with The Terrapins, and with the University of Maryland School of Medicine during March to remind viewers about colorectal screening. "Madness is letting fear stand in the way of a screening test that could save your life," says Coach Williams.

The ACG recommends men and women at average risk for colorectal cancer to begin screening at age 50. African-Americans should begin colorectal cancer screening at 45. The 2009 ACG evidence-based colorectal cancer screening guidelines divide the options into *cancer prevention tests* and *cancer detection tests*.
